Please be seated for the Lessons

In the Old Testament lesson this morning, Ezra reads from the law of Moses in the midst of the people who have returned from exile and are rebuilding Jerusalem. The words incite mourning for their sins and long years in exile, but Ezra tells them that hearing the voice of God is always an occasion for joy. This lesson also shows us that when Jesus, in the gospel reading this morning, reads and interprets the scriptures, he is continuing a longstanding pattern of Jewish worship. The church continues this pattern in its worship to this day.

First Lesson

Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10

All the people of Israel gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told the scribe Ezra to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the LORD had given to Israel. Accordingly, the priest Ezra brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all

who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month. He read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand; and the ears of all the people were attentive to the book of the law. And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was standing above all the people; and when he opened it, all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people answered, "Amen, Amen," lifting up their hands. Then they bowed their heads and worshiped the LORD with their faces to the ground. So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation. They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading.

And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, "This day is holy to the LORD your God; do not mourn or weep." For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. Then he said to them, "Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions of them to those for whom nothing is prepared, for this day is holy to our LORD; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the LORD is your strength."

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people. Thanks be to God.

Psalm 19

- 1. The heavens declare your glory, O God, * and the firmament shows your handiwork.
- 2. One day tells its tale to another, * and one night imparts knowledge to another.
- 3. Although they have no words or language, * and their voices are not heard,
- 4. Their sound has gone out into all lands, * and their message to the ends of the world.
- 5. In the deep you have set a pavilion for the sun; * it comes forth like a bridegroom out of his chamber; it rejoices like a champion to run its course.
- 6. It goes forth from the uttermost edge of the heavens and runs about to the end of it again; * nothing is hidden from its burning heat.
- Your law, O God, is perfect and revives the soul; * Your testimony is sure and gives wisdom to the innocent.
- 8. Your statutes are just and rejoice the heart; * your commandment is clear and gives light to the eyes.
- 9. The fear of you is clean and endures for ever; * your judgments are true and righteous altogether.
- 10. More to be desired are they than gold, more than much fine gold, *

sweeter far than honey, than honey in the comb.

- 11. By them also is your servant enlightened, * and in keeping them there is great reward.
- 12. Who can discern unwitting sins? * Cleanse me from my secret faults.
- 13. Above all, keep your servant from presumptuous sins; let them not get dominion over me; * then shall I be whole and sound, and innocent of a great offense.
- 14. Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, * O God, my strength and my redeemer.

The apostle Paul uses the metaphor of the human body to describe the organic connectedness and unity of the church. The members of the church in Corinth were in competition with one another over which spiritual gifts were the most important and it was dividing the community. Paul calls them to remember that the many gifts were given by God for the good of the whole, and each is necessary to the functioning of the church.

Second Lesson

1 Corinthians 2: 1-11

Just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body--Jews or Greeks, slaves or free--and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so

arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.

Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people. Thanks be to God.



Gospel Anthem

PART 1:

Near the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, he visits the synagogue in his hometown of Nazareth, reading from the section of Isaiah which talks about the Jubilee—a time when all debts are forgiven, all land returned to its original owner and all slaves are freed. Filled with the Spirit, Jesus claims this theme of liberation as his identity, purpose and mission.

Gospel Lesson

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,

because he has anointed me

to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives

and recovery of sight to the blind,

- to let the oppressed go free,
- to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

And so, remembering all that was done for us: the cross, the tomb, the resurrection and ascension, longing for Christ's coming in glory, and presenting to you these gifts your earth as formed and human hands have made, we acclaim you. O Christ:

Dying, you destroyed our death. Rising, you restored our life. Christ Jesus, come in glory!

Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts of bread and wine that they may be to us the Body and Blood of your Christ. Grant that we, burning with your Spirit's power, may be a people of hope, justice and love.

Giver of life, draw us together in the Body of Christ, and in the fullness of time gather us with all your people into the joy of our true eternal home.

Through Christ and with Christ, and in Christ, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, we worship you our God and Creator in voices of unending praise.

Blessed are you now and for ever. Amen.
