

The Word of God

This passage from the book of Isaiah is well known because of its reference to a young woman (in Hebrew) or virgin (in the more familiar Greek) conceiving and bearing a son. In its original context, the identity of the woman is not clear—perhaps she was Ahaz's wife. The birth of a child in the very near future is meant as a sign to reassure Ahaz, the king of Judah, that God will intervene in history and not let his enemies destroy him. For Christians, however, Isaiah's words have a universal, messianic context. God's own son, born of Mary, and named Emmanuel—God with us—represents God's intervening in human history for all time.

First Lesson

Isaiah 7:10-16

Again the LORD spoke to Ahaz, saying, Ask a sign of the LORD your God; let it be deep as Sheol or high as heaven. But Ahaz said, I will not ask, and I will not put the LORD to the test. Then Isaiah said: "Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for

you to weary mortals, that you weary my God also? Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel. He shall eat curds and honey by the time he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good. For before the child knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good, the land before whose two kings you are in dread will be deserted."

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people. Thanks be to God.

Psalm 80: 1-7, 16-18

- 1. Hear, O Shepherd of Israel, leading Joseph like a flock; * shine forth, you that are enthroned upon the cherubim.
- 2. In the presence of Ephraim, Benjamin, and Manasseh, * stir up your strength and come to help us.
- 3. Restore us, O God of hosts; * show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.
- 4. O God of hosts, * how long will you be angered despite the prayers of your people?
- 5. You have fed them with the bread of tears; * you have given them bowls of tears to drink.
- 6. You have made us the derision of our neighbors, * and our enemies laugh us to scorn.
- Restore us, O God of hosts; * show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.
- 16. Let your hand be upon those at your right hand, * those whom you have made so strong for yourself.
- 17. So we may never turn away from you, * give us life, that we may call upon your Name.
- Restore us, O God of hosts; * show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

Nowhere in the writings of Paul does he make any reference to the miraculous birth story of Jesus, although he, too, believes that Jesus has both human and divine origins. Jesus was descended from the human house of David—and son of God by the power of the Holy Spirit. For Paul, Jesus' divinity is shown most clearly by his resurrection from the dead.

Second Lesson


Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, which he promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh and was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith among all the Gentiles for the sake of his name, including yourselves who are called to belong to Jesus Christ, To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people . Thanks be to God.

Gospel Anthem:

Please stand, as you are able for the Anthem and reading of the Gospel.



In today's gospel reading, Joseph, not Mary takes center stage. God had intervened before in the birth of some he has chosen – Isaac, Jacob and Samuel – but never before had God he replaced the whole male role! Even so, God's messenger assures Joseph that he still has a role to play: Jesus is legally descended from David through him. Joseph is described as a "righteous man", one who followed the laws of God. And yet his regard for the law was balanced by a sense of compassion that exemplified the higher values of the Kingdom that would be proclaimed by Jesus.

Gospel Lesson

Matthew 1:18-25

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

"Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,"

which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.

Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

At God's table, there is food for all who are hungry. If you are seeking God and a deeper knowledge of Jesus Christ, you are welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you are not baptized, and would like to learn more about what this could mean for you please speak to our rector, Nancy. Communion will be distributed at the bottom of the chancel steps. Gluten-free wafers are available. Please consume the bread at the time you receive it and move to the chalice located at either side aisle. It is preferred that you sip from the chalice rather than dipping your bread. The alcohol-free chalice will be available in addition to wine on the right-hand side. If you prefer to receive only the bread, simply bypass the chalice and return to your seat. If you prefer not to receive bread or wine at this time, remain seated and make a spiritual communion, in solidarity with those who are at home.

A Prayer for Unity

Loving God, beyond limits of time and space, you come to us unbidden, and you sustain us in body and in spirit. We are grateful to receive you, as we are and where we are, whether we receive you in physical or spiritual bread. Give us grace to respond this day, and in the days to come. We long to unite ourselves wholly to you and to one another, and in all things remain a Eucharistic people, the body of Christ, in whose name we pray. Amen.

For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world.

In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine. We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant.

Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, forever. Amen.


