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RECTOR'S REFLECTION, January 2022

Dear Trinity Family,

This is the second Rector's Report on the life of our faith community that I have written during pandemic conditions. So much has changed, it is difficult to know where to start. Perhaps, therefore, I will begin with what has *not* changed: **God is good.** All the time. All the time. God is good.

At our baptism God names us "Beloved", seals us with the Holy Spirit and promises to be with us, no matter what. And at our baptism, with God's blessing soaking into our skin along with the water and holy oil, we agree to this covenant: we are beloved in order to be loving. We are blessed to be a blessing to others.

That much is unchanged. We are loved and we are called.

Nor has this changed: **The members of Trinity Buckingham are good, loving, faithful people.** We love God and care deeply for one another. We care about the church.

What *has* changed—and it was changing even before a pandemic disrupted our lives on all levels—is *how* we, as individuals and as a church, carry out our call to bless and love. We are not the church we were 20 years ago, 10 years ago or even 5 years ago. Nor, frankly, should we be, because creation is always moving into God's future and the church must move with it. The church—not just Trinity, Buckingham, but the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church—is changing and *must* change in response to the realities and needs of a changing world.

This is a time of discernment for Trinity. The ways of being church that many of us grew up with—a full sanctuary with a robust team of lay ministers on Sundays; a large choir; Sunday School and Youth Group; active pastoral care, finance, property, fellowship, education and outreach committees—are, increasingly, a thing of the past.

I have heard your longing for a return to that past, but more than that, I have heard your longing for a church full of *newer, younger, other people* to lead worship, swell the choir, visit the lonely, ill or grieving, keep the books, care for the property, coordinate fellowship, education and social justice ministries. Because we are fewer in number, we are growing older, we have "been there, done that" as lay ministers of God's reign in the church and the world for decades. It's time for a younger generation to take over! Believe me, I understand that longing. But, I have some bad news. I'm afraid there is just *us*.

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For the most part, our children have grown, and left the area, or left Trinity. They did not stay to carry on the ministries of the church they were raised in. And the newer, younger, other people who *have* come to Trinity have come to a different church than the one we long for. There have, in the last decade, been few active vital ministries for new folks to join, to be mentored in, to help shape or to assume leadership of.

Certainly 22 months of pandemic have not helped. One might argue that in last two years there *has been* nothing besides limited worship to take part in. But that is not precisely true. There have actually been quite a few virtual offerings of fellowship, pastoral care, spiritual growth and social justice during quarantine, but few older or newer members chose to take part in them. And that's something we'll need to talk about going forward.

But for right now, friends, what I really want to say is: We are it. Those of us who have taken the time to read this annual report, those of us who are attending the annual meeting in person, those of us who, because of health concerns or other circumstances are joining virtually this morning. *We* are Trinity Buckingham church. It's just us.

I know it's not what we hoped for or expected. And maybe it's not fair. But this is the hand we've been dealt. We are the ones who are here. The present and future of Trinity Buckingham, with God's help, belongs to us. Not to the wished-for *others* who are *not* here. As Martha said in her fine sermon a few weeks ago—we are the ones who are anointed to fulfill God's word TODAY, not tomorrow, not some day.

And that's not bad news at all. Take a look around. Look at the faces of those we have grown, grown up, grown older and grown old in the faith with. We have sung with one another, given thanks with one another, praised God with one another, cared for on neighbors in need with one another, raised funds with one another, interceded for and with one another, shared bread and wine and pancakes and corned beef with one another, pulled weeds and bagged clothing with one another. Just us. The good, loving, faithful people of Trinity Buckingham. Who better to discern the present and future of Trinity with? Who better to work side by side with in the ongoing work of reconciling the world?

And yes, we *are* fewer in number and we *are* older. And yes, many of us *have* given years of active ministry to the church and would prefer to be retired. But we, fewer, older, weary folks are God's handiwork, and in God's hands we have plenty of life left. *We* are still beloved and *we* are still called.

We—the members of Trinity as we are and where we are today—are the vessels that hold the wine of God's blessing. We can wring our hands and talk about who's to blame that we aren't what we were, and lament that Trinity's wine has run out. We can continue to wait for newer, younger, other people to bring different vessels for God to work through. OR we can take this moment in time and offer who we are and what we have to be transformed by our loving God for this moment in history.

This is a time of discernment for Trinity. God isn't calling us to be who we used to be. God isn't calling us to discern a mission for other people to fulfill. So we need to start with who we are right now, and what moves our spirits and what breaks our hearts and what spurs us to action. We need to discern how we will use the resources of time, talent and treasure that we have to use in this moment.

This is a time of discernment for Trinity. And so, I'm asking you to engage...with me, with the vestry, and with one another. We need to come together, in small and large groups, in person and virtually, in prayer and in conversation to discern what part of God's work in the world is *ours* to do *today*. And also what part of this work is *yours*.

If it's **worship**, you, not other people, are going to need to come to worship, when and as the state of public health make that possible. Or give a Zoom Vespers or Morning Prayer a try. And not just come, but share in proclaiming the word and leading the prayers and welcoming people and following up with visitors and setting the table and washing dishes.

If it's **outreach**, you, not other people, are going to need to take part in reimagining what Trinity's outreach and social justice ministries might look like now. It might be resuming the bread ministry. It might be a return to Community PeaceMeal. The Code Blue Shelter has moved permanently to Our Lady of Guadalupe in January, but maybe Trinity is called to address the lack of affordable housing in Central Bucks as our part in ministering to and with our un-housed neighbors. And you'll need, not just to imagine those outreach ministries, but to take an active part in carrying them out.

If it's **pastoral care**, you, not other people, are going to need to come together regularly as people called to caring ministries, to pray for and visit and call and send cards and meet the short term and long term needs of those who are ill or lonely or grieving.

If it's a ministry for and with **children and youth and their families**, you, not other people, will need to become teachers and mentors. And if you *have* children and teens, you will need to speak about what programs and ministries you actually need and desire, and help shape those programs and ministries when they are offered.

If you have a heart for caring for the **property and buildings** that have been entrusted to us by Trinity Buckingham's previous generations, then you, not other people, will need to form

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an active property committee and discern ways of maintaining, improving and preserving our physical plant.

If you wish to see Trinity on a stable **financial** footing today and in the future, you, and not other people, will need to continue to pledge, continue to support the costs of operating as a parish in the Diocese of Pennsylvania. You will need to tend to the weekly work of managing our investments, growing our endowments, making financial decisions and seeing to the ongoing financial operations of the parish.

On the other hand, maybe God is calling us and you to none of these things. **Maybe God has something entirely new in mind for the members, buildings, and money that we have.** What that might be, I don't know. This is a time of discernment for Trinity. Not the rector's discernment, not the vestry's discernment, not other people's discernment, but our discernment together, each and every one of us.

If this all sounds like a lot of work, you're right! But I do trust that, as the song says, "if you believe and I believe and we together pray, the Holy Spirit must come down and set God's people free." We, together, are called to talk and pray and act and then talk and pray and act some more. It's going to take all of us, and yes, it is going to take time and work.

This may not be what you hoped or wanted to hear this morning—a call to re-engagement, hard work and ways of being church that may be very different from what we have known, from what we have asked for or from what we have yet imagined.

And if you are saying "thanks, but no thanks!" Well, that's a discernment, too. If you prayerfully discern that you are *not* called to be part of reimagining what it is to be church, and *not* called, according to your abilities, to be an active participant in Trinity's existing or emerging ministries, and *not* called to invest in Trinity Buckingham with your resources of time, talent or treasure...that's ok. That is a good and honest discernment. You are still beloved. And maybe your calling is elsewhere. But we, your priest and your vestry and the other members of your faith community, need for you to *tell* us that is what you've discerned. Because it is quite difficult to know about your thoughts, feelings, needs or other callings if you don't share them.

God's people are blessed to be a blessing, beloved to love. We know what that has looked like in the past. We do not know what it will look like in the future. But, my brothers and sisters gathered here today, there are none besides us who can discern God's call to Trinity in the present.

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I want to end with a word of hope. Because I AM hopeful. Not that we will be again what we have been, not that other people will come and make us what we once were, but that *we* will be something new—a new expression of God's love and blessing in the world according to how we are called TODAY. I am hopeful because we have one another and we have a God who loves us and who calls us to be love in the lives of others. (Thanks for that phrase, Martha!)

I think it is a story of hope that St. Luke is telling today about the fishermen who have gone out of their boats after a night of unfruitful fishing. Peter and the others have cleaned their nets and are ready to go home. That's it. No fish. They are tired and discouraged. Their future doesn't look real promising if this keeps happening. Then along comes Jesus. Jesus tells the tired, discouraged, skeptical fishermen to go back out into the deep water and to let down their nets one more time. And when they do what he tells them.... the abundance of fish threatens to break the nets and swamp the boats. If that's not a story of hope and transformation, I don't know what is.

I have hope because I trust in the One who calls us to row out into the deep again and let down our nets one more time. I trust in the faithfulness of a loving Creator who has never withdrawn Divine love and companionship from creation. I am hopeful because I believe that God loves and companions creation in a special and intentional way through the community of the baptized—the Church. One, holy and catholic, yes, but also THIS church, Trinity, Buckingham. As it is...as *we* are...today. I believe that the Church—this church—exists and will continue because God loves us and the Holy Spirit empowers us and we belong to Christ and the world needs us.

There is more to come. I'm going back out into the deep water and letting down my nets once more. Are you coming?



RECTOR'S REPORT

In the past, the Annual Report has contained reports from various ministry leaders. Of course, 2020 and 2021 have not been "usual" years, and ministries, if they have been able to happen at all, have not been happening in "usual" ways, so what follows looks less "usual" and is instead my (Pastor Nancy's) broad brush-strokes recap of the year.

<u>Worship</u>

2021 opened with the church in quarantine once more. Although we had been able to return to limited in-person worship from September through November 2020, at the beginning of Advent, the rising COVID numbers necessitated a return to virtual worship. Fortunately, this time, we already had the audio-visual system in place in the sanctuary to be able to livestream and pre-record worship from the sanctuary. A small team of rotating lay worship leaders and I led Morning Prayer on Sundays, accompanied by Martha and the occasional soloist. In-person worship with (bread only) Eucharist resumed just prior to Easter with both a traditional service, with music, in the sanctuary and a Children of All Ages service held outdoors in the parking lot.

Come fall, with a majority of the congregation now vaccinated, lower COVID numbers, we honored the request of many parishioners to resume worship at 8 am.

Sunday services have been supported by a small crew of faithful lay welcome and worship leaders, altar guild and audio/visual ministers.

To the delight of all, the choir returned, first as pick-up choirs during the summer and fall, and then as a dedicated seasonal choir for Advent and Christmastide. The handbell ensemble also enriched our worship in the fall and early winter.

Attendance at the Children of All Ages service dropped dramatically beginning in June when school ended and has not picked up since. Factors include unvaccinated children, weather and the overwhelming demands on families during pandemic. At this point, it is unclear whether the Children of All Ages service will resume or not. I offer a "Pajama Vespers" service on YouTube (every Sunday since April '20), with bedtime prayers, songs and stories and teaching about Jesus and the church. With an average of 9 views each week, my best guess is that, during the pandemic, Pajama Vespers *is* church for many of those who formerly attended CoAA.

In terms of the 8 am and 10:30 am services, attendance has averaged 10 at the 8 am service and 30 at the 10:30 am service since September 2021. Between 25 and 50 people "attend" services virtually on the website and Facebook.

Morning Meditation/Morning Prayer is once again taking place in-person in Historic Trinity on Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 8 am, having been livestreamed on Facebook from April '20 through September '21.

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The Ann's Choice worship service returned this fall on the first Wednesday of the month at 10:30 with Trinity members who reside in the Ann's Choice community. Other members of Trinity are always welcome to attend.

<u>Personnel</u>

The Payroll Protection funds that enabled us to keep pre-COVID staffing in 2020 ran out at the beginning of 2021, making it necessary to furlough Regina Gordon (music director) and Danielle Badiali (facilities/rental coordinator) for the first three quarters of 2021. We made the very difficult decision to reconfigure our music and worship ministry, resulting in the end of Gina's position after nearly four decades of faithful service to Trinity. A wonderful celebration of Gina's ministry took place December 12, 2021.

Dani returned to work overseeing rentals, though with reduced hours, in September. Also in September, Martha Dudich was hired as the Lay Associate for Liturgy and Spirituality: a newly configured position supporting worship, music and spiritual formation.

Trinity continues to be blessed by our unfailingly cheerful and compassionate parish administrator, Cynthia Goode, by the crucial behind the scenes website and social media communications of Caroline Oakes and by Alison Rose, whose unending hard work as the director of the Trinity Buckingham Academy has secured licensing by both the Department of Education and Health and Human Services, and substantial grant funding this year and last.

<u>Fellowship</u>

During most of 2021 the ongoing pandemic put the kibosh on most social gatherings and food fellowship. Virtual coffee hour on Zoom came to an end due to lack of attendance. The Trinity Buckingham Good News newsletter put out by Marty and Lauren Gillen was joyfully received as a means of keeping us up to date on one another's lives, as well as cards and phone calls among parishioners. The few live fellowship events that did take place were sweetly refreshing, including a celebration of Jane Eastwood's 100th birthday in April, the celebration of Regina Gordon's ministry in December and First Sundays, beginning in September, the report of which is below.

Pastoral Care

One of the ministries that has been going strong all through the pandemic is the Prayer Chain. Coordinated by Patty Bradbury, and updated monthly, three teams of parishioners and friends of Trinity pray daily for those in need. Though not meeting in person, the Prayer Shawl ministry has knit and crocheted their prayers for healing and comfort into shawls, blankets and lap robes. Pandemic restrictions eased at hospitals and nursing facilities and retirement facilities enabling me to make some pastoral calls and bring communion when requested to the ill and homebound. Pastoral Care is a ministry in need of more and regular lay participation.

<u>Spiritual Growth</u>

The Fizz Bible continues on Zoom each Tuesday morning at 9 am. Because of the on-line format, Trinity members who have moved from the area have been able to stay connected and study the scriptures for the upcoming Sunday. New members are always welcome. No experience or familiarity with the Bible necessary!

EfM (Education for Ministry) meets on Monday afternoons, sometimes in person and sometimes on Zoom, as the state of the pandemic dictates. Seminar members come from 4 Episcopal parishes in the Central Bucks region. We'll soon be registering a new class for the fall. Speak to Pastor Nancy if you would like to know more.

Children's education has mainly been in the form of the Children of All Ages service and Pajama Vespers (in person and virtual) for the last several years. Due to insufficient numbers and the ongoing pandemic, there has been no dedicated youth ministry this year. Children and teens are always welcome at worship and the (re)development of children and youth programming will grow out of the needs of those who attend.

<u>First Sundays</u>

At their late-summer retreat, the Vestry decided that after more than a year of pandemic we needed to invest in rebuilding Trinity's sense of ourselves as a community. We began a series of First Sunday events designed to bring members from all three worshipping congregations (8 am, CoAA, 10:30 am) together for worship, fellowship and a program of spiritual formation. In October we celebrated St. Francis and Creation; in November, Diana Martinez taught us about the church year with pictures of Trinity's paraments (altar hangings) and stories of those who created them; in December we had Stations of Advent, and in January, we celebrated Epiphany with over 50 Nativity sets on loan from Trinity parishioners. Despite new COVID variants, attendance at each was nearly 50, and "a good time was had by all." We look forward to a time when public health conditions will allow even more of us to renew relationships, pray, give thanks, eat and laugh together. Stay tuned to see what First Sundays will bring in 2022.

Trinity by the numbers

Several factors have made it difficult in recent years to get a clear picture of Trinity's membership. The first is a question of what membership actually means in the twenty-first century. Is it baptized and confirmed Episcopalians? Is it those who identify Trinity as "my church" even if they do not attend worship or participate in programs and ministries? Is it those who contribute to the church financially? Who, exactly, is a member of Trinity?

The second thing that has made counting members difficult is, of course, the pandemic. There are so many people we simply haven't seen in almost 2 years!

One measure of membership has always been average Sunday attendance. Before COVID, Trinity's average Sunday worship attendance, across all three services was about 75, not including Christmas and Easter. Since March 16, 2020 the largest number we have had at in-person worship was 58, and the average is 33. Another 35 or so attend on-line, which suggests that attendance is holding steady.

So, my best guess at membership numbers uses these criteria: A member of Trinity is someone who has attended worship at least once since 2019, or who attends virtually (and has let us know), and/or has participated in a ministry or program at Trinity; and/or has supported Trinity's operating budget; and/or regularly opens the weekly e-blast; and/or has communicated with me, a vestry member or the church office.

By that criteria, in 2021 the members of Trinity, Buckingham number 211 adults (over the age of 16) and 47 children (under the age of 16), representing 123 households.

Since 2020:

- 7 adults were removed from the rolls because they moved from the area
- 4 members died (Elaine Good, Frances Calkins, Joanne Fulcoly and Gregg Bittner) (We also grieve the loss of John Whelan, Karen Hoyt, Dennis Zak)
- 5 people asked to be removed from our rolls
- 40 were moved to inactive status (i.e. they have not met any of the above criteria since 2018 or earlier.

When our hearts are wintry, grieving, or in pain, the old Easter hymn continues, love is come again like wheat that springeth green. May Trinity's good work and worship spring ever green (no coincidence, the liturgical color brightening the sanctuary in these days) - brought to life with your active, intentional presence, your unique gifts, your essential spirit, your abiding care.

TRINITY BUCKINGHAM ACADEMY (TBA) REPORT

TBA was happy to offer our full program to families for the start of our 2021-2022 school year. We offer before school, lunch bunch, kids club and kindergarten enrichment alongside our traditional preschool, jump start and pre-kindergarten classes. Programs were adjusted to adhere to health and safety protocols as set forth by the PA Department of Education and PA Department of Human Services. TBA students wear masks inside the building and use the expansive space of Faith Hall for eating snacks/lunch at a safe distance from one another.

Our staff and students have done a wonderful job staying safe and healthy! We started the year with 20 preschool, 18 pre-kindergarten, 7 kindergarten enrichment and 4 jump start students. Enrollment increased 26% for a total of 53 TBA students with only 3 spots available in our afternoon kindergarten enrichment class. TBA augments our classroom programming with specialty offerings such as YOGA, Play and Praise, and Chapel classes. The students even participated in several ZOOM music classes!

On TBA's behalf, I applied for and received the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) stabilization grant through Keystone Stars as a part of our PA Department of Human Services License. This grant will be used for to further enhance the TBA programs during the COVID pandemic. Our staff has done an amazing job keeping our students happy and thriving throughout the school year. We are grateful to our wonderful families who've entrusted TBA with their children. We are thankful for the support from the TBA board of directors and church staff to help make this year successful. Our last day of school will be June 3rd.

PROPERTY REPORT

Numerous projects were done in the past year as we work to maintain our three buildings and property.

As always, Jim Sanders has taken the lead of most of these projects. Please give him a big thank you when you see him. We are so blessed that he gives so generously of his time and talent to Trinity.

Below are many of the issues we dealt with this past year:

- Installed a new door to replace the rotted side entry door to Historic Trinity.
- Replaced the furnace for the office area, and replaced the combined furnace/air conditioner that supports Reed Chapel and TBA office. The heating and air conditioning units that support the classrooms and Faith Hall are the original equipment. Their 20+ year age suggests that they will need to be replaced in the future.
- Replaced the 20+ year old roof replacement on our church, office and preschool building. This also included repairing and painting the steeple. installing gutter

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guards and replacement of attic fans.

- We continued the conversion of church lighting to LED lamps and fixtures with rebate support from PECO. Most of the 4-foot fluorescent tubes have been replaced, and the parking lot lights are scheduled for replacement in January 2022. We are evaluating converting additional interior lights based on the costs and benefits.
- Installed accordion-style door between two classrooms to facilitate activities of separate classes.
- The rectory basement was flooded by the big storm we experienced in the fall. The water heater needed to be replaced, and there was significant damage to the rector's personal property. We are considering installing a sump pump to augment the existing floor drain.
- The dishwasher in the kitchen has broken down after 20 years. We are evaluating options for replacement.
- The rectory dishwasher was replaced.
- With insurance money received, the tree damaged by a car accident in front of property was removed.
- The black top on the parking lot was re-sealed and parking lines re-painted.
- The parking lot lights will have cost saving LED bulbs installed.
- The property's well pump stopped working and was replaced.
- The attic was purged and cleaned. This should be done on an annual basis.
- We hired a new lawn maintenance company and they are doing an excellent job.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The very good news is that Trinity ended 2021 in the black by approximately \$70,000. This is attributable to the faithful giving and generosity of Trinity parishioners, as well as to the forgiveness of a \$53,000 payroll protection plan loan from 2020, and a \$22,600 insurance settlement for damage sustained by the property following a car crash on 413.

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As we look ahead to 2022, this budget surplus will be available to offset a projected deficit in the operating budget of approximately \$44,000.


Trinity Deputies to the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania (DIOPA)
