Please be seated for the Lessons

The God revealed to the prophet Isaiah is not a God who will be appeased by outward shows of piety, but rather One who longs for human justice and compassion. God calls for a groundswell of loving actions that make a difference to those who are poor, powerless or in mourning. We serve God best not by what we say on Sunday, but by how we live the rest of the week.

Isaiah 58:1-12

First Lesson

Shout out. do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins. Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God: they ask of me righteous judgments, they delight to draw near to God. "Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?" Look, you serve your own interest on your fast day, and oppress all your workers. Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high. Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the LORD? Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?

Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am. If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. The LORD will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong;

and you shall be like a watered garden,

like a spring of water,

whose waters never fail.

Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt;

you shall raise up the foundations of many generations;

you shall be called the repairer of the breach,

the restorer of streets to live in.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people. Thanks be to God.

Psalm 112: 1-9

- 1. Alleluia! Happy are they who fear God, * and have great delight in the commandments!
- 2. Their descendants will be mighty in the land; * the generation of the upright will be blest.
- 3. Wealth and riches will be in their house, * and their righteousness will last for ever.
- 4. Light shines in the darkness for the upright; * the righteous are merciful and full of compassion.
- 5. It is good for them to be generous in lending * and to manage their affairs with justice.
- 6. For they will never be shaken; * the righteous will be kept in everlasting remembrance.
- They will not be afraid of any evil rumors; * their heart is right; they put their trust in God.
- 8. Their heart is established and will not shrink, * until they see their desire upon their enemies.
- 9. They have given freely to the poor, * and their righteousness stands fast for ever; they will hold up their head with honor.

Paul's letter to the church at Corinth continues to scold them for their many divisions. In today's verses he takes to task those who believe they are wise—those who value "lofty words" and Greek philosophy—and so look down upon the less well educated. By contrast, the truly wise are those, like Paul, who see what the Spirit revealed in the cross of Christ—God's power revealed in weakness.

Second Lesson

1 Corinthians 2:1-12

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.

Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But, as it is written,

"What no eye has seen, nor ear heard,

nor the human heart conceived,

what God has prepared for those who love him"—

these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people. Thanks be to God.

Please stand as you are able for the proclamation of the Gospel.



This passage from Matthew's gospel is part of Jesus' "Sermon on the Mount." First, he calls on his followers to be examples to others. The life of faith must be outwardly visible and attractive. Next, Jesus tells his listeners that he has not come to abolish the law, but to give it a make-over. He has come to reveal the love and compassion of God that underlies the law, and to call people see in the law a means of treating others with that same love and compassion.

Gospel Lesson

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot.

"You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.

"Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."

Nicene Creed

- We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.
- We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father;

Shine for the afflicted, O God; remind them of your deep compassion and how you tenderly bear all our sorrows. We pray for the Code Blue shelter guests and volunteers. At God's table, there is food for all who are hungry. If you are seeking God and a deeper knowledge of Jesus Christ, you are welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you are not baptized, and would like to learn more about what this could mean for you please speak to our rector, Nancy. Communion will be distributed at the bottom of the chancel steps. Gluten-free wafers are available. Please consume the bread at the time you receive it and move to the chalice located at either side aisle. It is preferred that you sip from the chalice rather than dipping your bread. The alcohol-free chalice will be available in addition to wine on the right-hand side. If you prefer to receive only the bread, simply bypass the chalice and return to your seat. If you prefer not to receive bread or wine at this time, remain seated and make a spiritual communion, in solidarity with those who are at home.

And so, remembering all that was done for us: the cross, the tomb, the resurrection and ascension, longing for Christ's coming in glory, and presenting to you these gifts your earth as formed and human hands have made, we acclaim you. O Christ:

Dying, you destroyed our death. Rising, you restored our life. Christ Jesus, come in glory!

Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts of bread and wine that they may be to us the Body and Blood of your Christ. Grant that we, burning with your Spirit's power, may be a people of hope, justice and love. Giver of life, draw us together in the Body of Christ, and in the fullness of time gather us with all your people into the joy of our true eternal home.

Through Christ and with Christ, and in Christ, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, we worship you our God and Creator in voices of unending praise.

Blessed are you now and for ever. Amen.
