RECTOR'S REPORT FOR 2023

It's hard to know where to begin my rector's report for 2023. With grief or gratitude, lament or laud? There has been so much of each in the last twelve months.

In January last year I enrolled in a certificate program in Death and Dying at OneSpirit Seminary in New York. My graduation project was a series of workshops here at Trinity that I called "Plan Your Own—Or Someone Else's—Funeral."

I never dreamed how soon or how often I would put what I learned to use. There have been so many deaths and funerals in our little faith community in 2023! We commended to our loving God: (the Rev.) Kyle St. Claire, Pete Krauss, Joe Parker, Elizabeth Crooke, Al Fuchs, Dan Wisnom, Jane Eastwood and John Brooks this year. Beloved members of this community for decades. Pillars of the church. Strong warp threads in the fabric of our common life. So much loss. So much grief.

And these are just some among many other deaths that have touched our community. Many of us, including Steve and me, lost parents, children, siblings, aunts, uncles, cousins, friends and colleagues last year. **Our community is grieving.**

And we grieve not just for our loved ones. We are also in mourning for the church (\underline{c} hurch and \underline{C} hurch) that used to be. Trinity has fewer members, volunteers and programs than it did in its prime. Gone are the days when we had to put chairs in the aisles in order to fit the Christmas Eve congregation, and when we wondered whether we had enough classroom space for all the Sunday School students.

These days we struggle to find ushers and readers for a congregation of 35, and our Sunday School can sit together at a single table. If even one person is missing, we don't have enough bell ringers to play a simple anthem. The annual Rummage Sale and weekly coffee hour have—like Open Circle Dinners and Crabfest—become memories. Yes, our community is grieving.

During my 8-week Sabbatical last fall, the Vestry hired the Rev. Mary McCullough to fill in, and she did a lot of listening. The transcripts of Mary's one-on-one and community-wide conversations and the report she wrote for me and the Vestry held no real surprises. They were all variations on the same theme: **Trinity is no longer the church she once was.**

We have shrunk in numbers, there are fewer and fewer volunteers to carry out the ministries of the parish, and the members and volunteers who remain are growing older. We are less engaged in what's happening at church. We are less able and less interested in doing all the things we once did. We haven't much interest, energy or ability to try new things. Our community mourns for what used to be. Our community is grieving.

Mary gave the Trinity community an opportunity to talk about your grief and she gave, I think, broad permission to be sad about all the losses: loved ones, cherished programs, young people and our own youth. She assured you (and I do, too) that is ok to be sad that the church has changed.

This is not the future we expected. We expected to hand on the legacy of a thriving and vital Trinity to the next generation. We expected that new—and younger—people would inhabit the church we built; that new and younger people would be grateful to inherit the programs and ministries we started, grew and nurtured; that new and younger people would joyfully continue to care for our buildings, programs and ministries just as we did.

But our expectations were not met. Those things didn't happen. The new and younger people didn't come. Or those that came didn't stay.

As 2023 came to an end, many of us took the opportunity my sabbatical offered to turn to one another and acknowledge our unmet expectations. And to admit that those expectations are probably not going to be met. New and younger people are probably not going to come and turn Trinity Buckingham back into the church that it used to be. And that is sad. We are sad. And that's ok.

Mary McCullough *also* helped Trinity to name something else. Something very important. It was an important confirmation for me as I returned from sabbatical. And it is something that I want to highlight for you in this annual report: **Being sad is not the same as being unhappy.**

Your conversations with Mary confirmed what I know to be true of Trinity, Buckingham. Most of us are not unhappy with our life together at Trinity. In fact, although we wish we were greater in number, and that our average age were younger, we are, in fact, a happy and faithful community. We are a mainly healthy and harmonious church community, with very little internal conflict. In a world community that is often at odds with one another and mistrustful, Trinity is an oasis of kindness and compassion. This is truly something to laud. **There is much to be thankful for at Trinity, just as we are right now.**

- We love one another. We truly and genuinely care about one another. We enjoy being together. Sharing a cup of coffee and a nosh is just a cover for what we really crave—sharing our stories and our lives with one another. We reach out to one another when there is trouble, and we celebrate one another's joys. We are a welcoming community.
- We find deep meaning and connection in Sunday worship. We appreciate the music that stirs our emotions and lifts our hearts, sermons that challenge us and enliven the imagination of our faith, and liturgy that helps up put into words our deep longings and our profound thanks
- We are, to our core, a generous and giving people. And Trinity church helps us care for and share with others beyond our walls. Though our physical capacity for service has diminished as our bodies age, Trinity continues to provide outreach opportunities that are within our means, whether it is bringing a can of food for the New Britain Larder, or toys for the Santa Shoppe or supplies for the Bucks Housing Group apartment, or a check for Episcopal Relief and Development. Serving others gives meaning to our lives, and we are grateful for how Trinity helps us to continue to care for "the least of these."

For those who are so inclined, Trinity provides opportunities to grow spiritually. The Tuesday Fizz Bible Study is a weekly anchor for its participants. The "Little Blue/Black Books" of Advent and Lenten meditations nurture faith.

At Trinity's core, then, nothing has really changed. We were and we are called to mutual care, to service and to worship.

As we begin the next eight years of our journey together with God, can we let those bedrock, and still-present truths, rather than our expectation of filling the church with new younger people be our guide? Can we temper our grief with gratitude and conclude our laments, as the Psalms so often do, with lauds?

How will we, older, tired, small in numbers, faithful, generous, compassionate people care for one another, worship God, and serve others?

And—since our buildings and property are, in fact, a legacy from our forebears in the faith and from our younger selves--how will we older, tired, small in numbers, faithful, generous, compassionate people provide for their care and upkeep?

Our focus in 2024 will be on developing the areas of our common life:

- 1. Worship
- 2. Pastoral Care
- 3. Fellowship
- 4. Service
- 5. Care for the container (that is, our buildings and property)

Using these resources: The older, tired, small in numbers, faithful, generous, compassionate people of Trinity Church who are here now.

And I hope that you will join me and the Vestry in Faith Hall after worship on February 4, 2024 as we get started.

Glory to God whose power working in us can accomplish infinitely more that we can ask or imagine. Glory to God from generation to generation in the Church and in Christ Jesus forever and ever.

Perhaps you attended the 10am worship last month honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr, that opened with the hymn "Here I Am, Lord." Several present asked me afterwards why I stopped playing on the final refrain (fearful perhaps the piano, too, had issues!) "I wanted us to hear one another," I replied. There had been full-throated participation, insisting "I will go where You lead me" and I thought the community might feel strengthened and encouraged as their united commitment resounded in the sanctuary. I based this on the simple truth that my own faith has been formed and transformed by vibrant worship: provocative preaching, enthusiastic congregational singing, generous hospitality and practical care taking place within a kinship of vision and possibilities.

The work of shaping and engaging such faith experiences is good and important – and yes, work! – and I am most grateful for those who steadfastly offer their gifts in such service at Trinity: proclaimers of the Word, ministers of hospitality, music and the Eucharist, acolytes, Altar Guild and AV techs who unite us to worshippers at home. FINANCIAL REPORT for 2023

As our December financials are still being prepared, I will summarize where we are now. I assumed the position of Accounting Warden in October and I can report that our policies and procedures are working thanks to all our volunteers and our parish administrator. Prior to October, our finances were the responsibility of a Finance Committee that met quarterly, prepared budgets, and advised the Vestry.

As we look at 2023, it was an unusual year from both a Revenue and Expense Standpoint. Our budget projected a spending deficit of approximately \$15,000 yet we will end the year with a surplus between \$50-60 thousand. Why?

Pledges were higher which was a positive. Memorials were also higher because of the number of parish members we lost during the year. Special Giving was up due to our efforts to close the gap of our projected budget deficit. Administratively we controlled our spending. We did not need to pay for snow plowing, and we did not start needed projects, so Buildings and Grounds was positive. Utilities were down. The 2023 budget number for Investment Income was high. We did not solicit Buildings and Grounds gifts and Transfers represent Rector Discretionary Gifts transferred to the RDF account.

For 2024 we are budgeting a deficit again as we expect Pledge income to be lower and expect fewer Memorials. Income is expected to be down \$30 thousand. Since we underspent our buildings and grounds monies last year, we will be spending substantially more this year as all our facilities need both major and minor work: current budget will be \$30 thousand plus. Hopefully with this year's surplus and managed spending elsewhere, we will see our way through 2024.

BUDGET for 2024

2024 Budget Narrative for Trinity Buckingham

After much prayerful discussion and study of the past year's (2023) budget and the ingathering of pledges for 2024, the Finance Committee and the Vestry of Trinity, Buckingham have determined an operating budget for 2024. Treasurer's reports are available to parishioners at any time. Please remember that it takes several months to close out the year and so the final report for 2023 is not yet available.

We expect that our operating expenses will be approximately \$337,500.

We expect that our income will be approximately \$306,500.

As you can see, the projected deficit is approximately \$31,000.

There is very little that we can cut on the expense side of the equation and still sustain the Trinity that we want to have.

We want to state that this is not an expense problem—we have cut our costs everywhere we can. What we have is an income problem.

We were fortunate in 2023 to have closed the gap substantially because property expenses came in far below budget, because of parishioner generosity with our "close the gap" campaigns, because of memorial gifts, and because of a one-time pension adjustment in Trinity's favor.

The Vestry and the Finance Committee would be very glad to know of your ideas for increasing our income and how you will help us act on those ideas.

PROPERTY REPORT for 2023 (With an Eye Towards 2024)

Over the course of each year a needs analysis is developed to identify and prioritize work and expenditures related to the physical plants that constitute our property. During the past year, focus was placed on upgrading bathroom facilities, exterior garden areas and maintenance of all structures and systems on the campus. In addition, resolution of water quality related issues comprised an important part of property work.

Going forward, 2024 needs have been identified and prioritized based on conditions of need and costs associated with "punch-listed" projects. Given financial limitations, this all-encompassing list has been reduced to comply with financial realities.

With this background, the vestry suggests priority be given to the following:

- 1. Church Exterior:
 - a. Building trim around the entire building is peeling and needs repainting.
 - b. Removal of the small, dead birch tree on rear of the church building;
 - c. Repair of identified parking lot asphalt areas and, if financially feasible coating of higher use sections
- 2. Church Interior, Utility & HVAC Systems
 - a. Replacement and repair of gasketing and thresholds of all entry doors with particular attention to double door fixtures;
 - b. Recognizing the aging (15-20 years) of HVAC units, setting aside monies for anticipated repairs/replacement of units in coming time periods;
 - c. Addressing Dept. of Environmental Protection provision of evidence assuring non-lead status of water system
- 3. Faith Hall / Kitchen
 - a. Attending to flooring condition of kitchen space
- 4. Historic Trinity:
 - a. Replacement of railings leading to front door entry and repair/replacement of steps leading up to same
 - b. Repair and possible replacement of side-entry door and provision of weather-guarding measures to avoid future damage
 - c. Analysis and repair of exterior stucco coating on chimney
 - d. Exterior painting of all portals and windows
- 5. Rectory
 - a. Repair/replacement of garage doors based on working condition

The above projects represent only a portion of property needs identified. Cost estimates are in progress. In addition, it is suggested that a grounds team of volunteers be reformed to address on-going appearance and upkeep needs proactively!

TRINITY BUCKINGHAM ACADEMY (TBA) REPORT

TBA was happy to welcome students for the 2023-2024 school year on September 11th 2023. Academy offerings include: before school, lunch bunch, kids club and kindergarten enrichment alongside our traditional preschool, jump start and pre-kindergarten classes. We opened our doors to 10 jump start (2 year old class) 18 preschool, 18 pre-kindergarten, and 5 kindergarten enrichment students for a total of 50 families. TBA augments our classroom programming with specialty offerings such as YOGA, Play and Praise, and Chapel classes, story time with Bill Wood, and Karate.

All TBA's teachers returned this year, some in different positions, which I view as a reflection of their dedication and agility in meeting the needs of the Academy and our students. TBA staff does an amazing job keeping our students happy and thriving throughout the school year, including our first annual ice cream social kicked off our school year in September.

TBA continues to meet licensing requirements of the PA Department of Education and Department of Human Services. To do so, staff must maintain all required certifications and continuing education hours each year.

Over last summer, TBA took on some "refreshing" projects including the women's bathroom and outside the TBA entrance. Jack DeLuca did an excellent job redoing the women's bathroom with new floor tiles, toilets and stalls. The outside entrance was a Rose family affair! Dylan Rose helped move the mulch and place the boarder. Megan and Sarah Rose painted the TBA rocks and flowers to help brighten up our school entrance. TBA hopes the colorful rocks reflect our joy and happiness of our staff and students!

This year, our inventive TBA parent board hosted several family fun events, such as parent coffees and a Christmas reception. The TBA parent board is also planning fundraisers planned for the spring, including a family photo day with the very talented Kelly Thibeault, a local photographer and former TBA parent along with dine and donate and our biggest event, the TBA art show and carnival!

We are grateful to our wonderful families who entrust TBA with their children. We are thankful for the support from the TBA board of directors and church staff to help make this year successful. Our last day of school will be June 7rd.

ACOLYTES

A lot of what we mean by living our faith is to serve others. If you have thought about how you could serve Trinity, be a part of a faith community and experience the joy in doing so, you might want to consider being an acolyte whose responsibly is to assist the minister with the liturgy.

You may not know that acolytes (altar boys/ men/girls or women) have been assisting Christian services since 250 AD. Initially they were a clerical order. It was quite recently, in the 1980s, that girls were permitted to be acolytes. The word acolyte means "follower" or one who helps or serves. Acolytes perform a number of functions before, during and following the service. If you, your son or daughter (age 10 and older) are interested in finding out more about becoming

an acolyte in serving Trinity's faith-based community please talk to Pastor Nancy or Jill Unger. Both of us would be delighted to talk to you about this important ministry.

When acolytes first helped with the service they carried candles in religious processions. In today's services they can do other duties such as "assist in worship by carrying a processional cross, lighting candles, holding the Gospel book for the Gospel readings, candle bearers or "torches", assisting a deacon or priest with the Holy Eucharist, swinging a censer or thurible, carrying the incense boat, handing the offering plates to ushers, and many other tasks as seen fit by the minister or deacon.
